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Exception report:

1. Study 2909 – This study is approved to keep lambs in metabolic cages 1- 7 weeks (until venous gradients are established and maintained) due to the sensitivity of the monitoring lines with in the first weeks of the study. These are especially sensitive to free movement of the animal and would benefit from mild restriction i.e. metabolic cages. This adaptation is due to the importance of the monitoring lines in the success of the original protocol. Advancement of line care and patency is ongoing however they wish to achieve the best results while maintaining the safety of the animal. If they have unlimited access to the lines (i.e. standard housing immediately) then the animals are at an increased risk for exsanguination or infection. Once the lines exit from the skin they are group together and wrapped in Vet wrap. These are then covered with a soft cotton cloth to try and prevent any chewing, rubbing and or dislodgment with animal movement.
2. The Laboratory Animal Resource Center has an "Exercise Exemption for Dogs Used in Radioactive Studies". The IU School of Medicine IACUC reviewed and approved both standard operating procedures during the July 2008 meeting.

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
