Dear Dr. Wang,

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your July 24, 2019 letter reporting an instance of noncompliance with the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at the Feinstein Institute for Medical Research. According to the information provided, OLAW understands that a mouse that had undergone surgery was not properly monitored post-operatively as required by the protocol, in part due to an intervening holiday. This animal activity was not supported by funds from the PHS or NSF.

Corrective and preventive actions included reminding the responsible party that arrangements for technical assistance can be made with the CCP if needed. Post-approval monitoring for this protocol was increased and the responsible party retrained. The PI will be included in the email notifications from the CCP. Backup emergency contact phone numbers from study personnel will be included and forms and procedures updated.

The prompt consideration of this matter by the Feinstein Institute for Medical Research was consistent with the philosophy of institutional self-regulation. OLAW concurs that the incident warranted reporting. Based on the information provided, OLAW is satisfied that appropriate actions have been taken to investigate this incident, make corrections, and prevent recurrence. We appreciate being informed of this matter and find no cause for further action by this office.

Dear Dr. Wolff:

I am writing to inform the Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare of an incident of serious non-compliance that occurred at the Center for Comparative Physiology (CCP) at the Feinstein Institute for Medical Research. While the research in question is not federally funded we are reporting this as non-compliance under the terms and conditions of our federal assurance.

A surgical procedure was performed on mice on 7/2/19. After IACUC investigation, it was determined that post-operative monitoring was not conducted by study personnel in accordance with the approved protocol. Post-operative monitoring was documented for 7/3/19 however it was not conducted on post-op day 2 (7/4/19). While post-operative monitoring was conducted on day 1, the frequency was inconsistent with the protocol. Post-operative monitoring resumed on post-op day 3 and was verified as being conducted in accordance with the protocol.

The responsible party was previously trained, is familiar with program process. This was purely an oversight in arrangements made for back up coverage during the holiday. CCP staff followed all program processes.

# Corrective Actions:

- Program resources are available to mitigate this issue. If study personnel are incapable of providing post-procedural monitoring of animals as described in the protocol and consistent with program guidelines, arrangements can be made with the CCP for technical assistance.
- Increased post-approval monitoring for this protocol, specifically, post-surgical.
- Responsible party will undergo retraining to ensure understanding and compliance with the corresponding IACUC protocol, IACUC approved animal care and use guidelines, and in the completion and documentation of records.
- 4. The Principal Investigator will be included in the email notifications from the CCP. PI bears responsibility of animals under study and should be afforded the opportunity to make alternate arrangements should study personnel fail to meet their assigned responsibilities.
- Study personnel will be required to include a backup emergency contact with phone numbers on surgical documentation.
- Revise instructions on all program forms to include the term "hollday", as applicable.
- Technical request instructions will be revised to ensure consistency throughout every program document, policy, and guideline.
- 8. If the PI or study teams fails to meet their responsibility to monitor post-operatively, and a CCP staff member identifies this, the CCP will notify the PI and study team via email and call them at phone contact numbers provided. A response deadline will be established. If the study team fails to respond, CCP will conduct the check and the PI will be charged for this service. Consistent with IACUC policy,

these incidents will be promptly be reported to the Animal Welfare Office. Repeat incidences may result in an individual's privileges being temporarily or permanently revoked.
