Dear Dr. Klotman,

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your March 5, 2019 letter reporting a serious deviation from the provisions of the Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at Duke University, following up on an initial telephone report on February 1, 2019. According to the information provided, OLAW understands that three newly weaned mice died due to lack of food. Following weaning, the mice were placed in a cage with hydration gel and bedding but no food. The problem was not noted by husbandry staff during the daily health check.

The corrective actions consisted of retraining the laboratory staff on weaning procedures including provision of food/water, refining the weaning practices, retraining the animal care staff on the appropriate conduct of daily health checks, counseling the Principal Investigator, and refining institutional procedures to ensure provision of food. The animal caretaker responsible is no longer employed by animal resources.

Based on its assessment of this explanation, OLAW understands that measures have been implemented to prevent recurrence of this problem. OLAW concurs with the actions taken by the institution to comply with the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. Note that when the same issue occurs in close proximity in different laboratories there may be a need to address the matter program wide. OLAW encourages the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee to raise awareness throughout the animal care and use program about appropriate weaning practices and the requirement to ensure that all animals have access to food/water. Thank you for keeping this Office apprised on this matter.

Duke University, in accordance with PHS Policy IV.F.3., provides this report of an incident, which involved an animal activity conducted or supported with PHS-funds or other funds with Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare oversight. This incident was reviewed and determined to be reportable by the Duke Institutional Animal Care & Use Committee (IACUC).

Reportable requirement: Conditions that Jeopardize the health or well-being of animals, including natural disasters, accidents, and mechanical failures, resulting in actual harm or death to animals.

**Preliminary report:** This incident was first reported to Dr. Neera Gopee, OLAW, on February 1, 2019 via a telephone call by Anna Hampton Anna Hampton, DVM, DACLAM, DACAW, CPIA, Director, Duke University Office of Animal Welfare Assurance.

Number of animals affected: 3 mice

**Description, outcome, and actions taken:** Mice were weaned from the dam. Upon weaning mice were provided hydration gel and extra bedding. Feed was not placed in the cages containing the weaned mice. Approximately 5-days later 3 mice were found dead and there was no food in the cage.

Upon identification of this concern the following corrective measures were taken:

- Laboratory personnel were retrained regarding appropriate mice weaning practices, to include providing food. In addition, the laboratory has refined its weaning practices to help prevent reoccurrence.
- Animal care personnel were retrained on the animal monitoring SOP and the expectations for daily animal cage checks. Note: The animal care personnel involved is no longer an employee of animal resources.
- The Principal Investigator met with the Attending Veterinarian and IACUC Chair to review the concern.
- Animal resources reviewed and refined current processes to ensure provision of food.

Conclusion: The Duke IACUC completed its investigation and performed final review of the issue at the February 28, 2019 IACUC meeting. The Duke IACUC determined that the incident was reportable to regulatory, granting, and oversight bodies, where applicable. In addition, the IACUC determined that the corrective actions were appropriate and no further actions were necessary. The Duke IACUC considers this incident closed.


