Dear Ms. McGill,

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your letter dated March 1, 2019 [read: April 1, 2019] regarding a reportable incident at your institution.

According to the information provided, our office understands that six mice on a protocol approved by the Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC) unexpectedly died or required euthanasia at the direction of the veterinarian. The P.I.'s team investigated the incident and determined that although the individuals that were involved had been trained, the issues stemmed from technical difficulties with the gavage procedure. Additional training was provided as a corrective measure. The full IACUC met on March 27, 2019 and approved the corrective measure but added the stipulation that the Veterinary Services Staff assist with future gavage procedures until the veterinarians are satisfied that the laboratory staff can safely perform the procedure. This incident did not involve any Public Health Service funding.

Based on its assessment of this explanation, OLAW understands that measures have been taken to prevent recurrence of this problem. OLAW concurs with the actions taken by your institution to comply with the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. Although this activity was not PHS funded, the establishment and application of policies and practices

that are consistent with the provisions of the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals are commendable and avoid the perception of a double standard. Please note that reports of noncompliance to OLAW should include dates of occurrence when describing


the incident. Please include this information in future submissions.

Dear Dr. Morse,

I am writing to inform you of a recent unanticipated problem that resulted in harm to 6 mice at our institution. The incident was associated with work supported with internal funding.

Three mice received an infectious agent by oral gavage under an IACUC approved protocol, performed by individuals who had been trained in the procedure. The administration was uneventful and well tolerated, however, the mice began looking ill 48 hours later. One died and the other two were euthanized at the direction of the veterinarian.

It was initially suspected that the agent was more virulent than previously reported. However, a subsequent trial with a control strain also resulted in the death of 3 more mice. The matter was investigated by the PI's team, who determined that the mouse deaths were the result of technical difficulties with the gavage procedure. Additional training has since been provided.

The incident was discussed at the regularly scheduled meeting of the full IACUC on March 27, 2019. The committee approved the additional training as remediation, with the added stipulation that Veterinary Services Staff will assist with future gavage procedures until the veterinarians are satisfied the procedure can be performed safely by the lab staff.
