Dear Dr. Thompson-Iritani,

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your February 3, 2022 letter reporting two incidents of noncompliance with the PHS Policy on the Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at the University of Washington. Your letter supplements the information in the prompt preliminary telephone report on December 16, 2021. According to the information provided it is understood that in the first incident, two of five adult female mice were discovered dead in the cage. The cage had no food in the feed hopper. The remaining three mice were treated and recovered. The mice had not been handled by the lab. Husbandry had last changed the cage eight days prior. In the second incident, a cage containing a breeding trio with eight live pups and two dead pups was found without food. The live animals received supportive care, and all recovered. The cage was likely last handled by the room technician nine days prior when the rack was changed. The animals in question were not supported by PHS funds.

Corrective and preventive actions: The Department of Comparative Medicine (DCM) re-trained all technicians that worked in these spaces during that time period and implemented a mystery cage program in those rooms to ensure that an animal technician is checking cages appropriately. If a technician repeatedly does not spot the mystery cage, then personnel action is taken. In January, DCM started a pilot study in one of their facilities where all cages placed in the rooms for investigators already have food in the hopper. DCM expects to evaluate the data after six months to determine the effectiveness of this potential solution.

OLAW believes that the corrective and preventive measures put in place by the University of Washington are consistent with the provisions of the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals for institutional self-monitoring and self-reporting. We look forward to the results of your preventive actions. OLAW views instances of lack of basic living requirements such as food, water, and a proper cage environment with great concern. We appreciate being informed of these matters and find no cause for further action by this office, at this time.

### Dear Dr. Morse:

This is a final report on 2 adverse events reported to OLAW by Dr. Stocking in a telephone call on 12/16/21.

In the first incident, a lab member discovered two of 5 adult female mice dead in the cage. The cage had no food in the feed hopper. The remaining 3 mice were treated and recovered. The mice had not been handled by the lab. Husbandry had last changed the cage 8 days prior.

In the second incident, a cage containing a breeding trio with 8 live pups and 2 dead pups was found without food. The live animals received supportive care, and all recovered. The cage was likely last handled by the room technician 9 days prior when the rack was changed.

Corrective Actions by Department of Comparative Medicine (DCM): Re-trained all technicians that worked in these spaces during that time period and implemented a mystery cage program in those rooms to ensure that an animal technician is checking cages appropriately. If a technician repeatedly does not spot the mystery cage, then personnel action is taken. In January, DCM started a pilot study in one of their facilities where all cages placed in the rooms for investigators already have food in the hopper. DCM expects to evaluate the data after six months to determine the effectiveness of this potential solution.

The IACUC reviewed the incident at its January meeting and found no further action necessary (considers the case closed.) The animals in question were not supported by PHS funds.
