Dear Dr. Goldentyer,

On behalf of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) and our 6.5 million members and supporters, I am writing to respectfully request that you refer the case of Novus Biologicals (Certificate 84-R-0089) to the USDA's Investigative and Enforcement Services in light of the persistent violations of the Animal Welfare Act (AWA) as documented by USDA inspectors. USDA inspections from the past five years document a continual failure to comply with the minimum requirements of the AWA. These violations, particularly related to the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC), have resulted in animal neglect and death.

In its April 2019 inspection report, the USDA documented that Novus Biologicals' IACUC approved the acquisition of 400 rabbits per year for two years when the research protocol justified acquisition of 200 rabbits per year. USDA regulations require that proposals contain a rationale for the appropriateness and approximate number of animals to be used, which is imperative for the IACUC to fulfill its duties. Further, the facility is unkempt and understaffed, and dried blood splatters were on supplies at the facility. Approximately 18% of rabbits were found to have dried blood on their ears and others to have lesions and long toenails, a sign of inadequate activity levels and poor monitoring and care.

During its compliance inspection conducted in March 2018, USDA cited Novus Biologicals for rabbits suffering significant weight loss and diarrhea without veterinary care. The issue was so severe that two rabbits were found dead. Further, some rabbits had overgrown toenails which could catch on the metal wires of their cages, putting them at risk for injuries.

The March 2017 and July 2016 USDA inspection reports document violations of the AWA related to Novus Biologicals' IACUC. Activities involving animals and departures from the protocol were not monitored, the IACUC chair approved his/her own protocol, and the IACUC did not review the program for humane care of animals or inspect all of the animal facilities as frequently as required. This lack of IACUC oversight resulted in substandard animal husbandry, including excessive bleeding of rabbits used to produce antibodies, which the
