Dr. Gibbens,

I am writing to you today to file an Official Complaint against ORA Inc. (14-R-0217) for clear violations of the Animal Welfare Act.

As you know, Ora Inc. of Andover, MA. was inspected 4/27/22. The cited violations were so severe that the inspector actually issued two separate reports for the inspection. The first report (attached) was for an extremely rare DIRECT violation. The text of this citation states:

"2.31(c)(7) Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC).

On April 27th, 2022, a study was initiated under IACUC protocol #2020-06-13 on 12 New Zealand rabbits involving the application of an experimental contact lens device to both eyes. The humane endpoints on the IACUC approved protocol state that if symptoms of ocular pain become so severe that the animal cannot open the eye and is reluctant to manually manipulating the eye to open, the animal will be euthanized. Research records and research staff indicate that 4 rabbits exhibited severe conjunctival swelling and redness. The research staff further report that the animals were so reluctant to open their eyes that general anesthetic was employed to restrain several animals for experimental observations. Per research staff, observations on this study are usually conducted on alert animals with brief manual restraint.

Failure of the research personnel to adhere to the humane endpoints in the IACUC approved protocol resulted in these animals experiencing unrelieved pain and distress and constitutes a significant change that was not reviewed or approved by the committee."

It is abundantly clear that these animals suffered horribly at the hands of Ora Inc's bungling staff. This kind of suffering should NEVER have been allowed to occur, and this facility deserves to be severely penalized for these abuses.

This report also delineates another incident in which Ora staff failed to follow an approved protocol and performed an unapproved procedure. Procedures are approved to allow proper safeguards to be in place to prevent unnecessary animal abuse. These failures to follow proper procedures clearly indicate that Ora staff ignores federal regulations on a frequent basis, and thus should be severely penalized.

The second inspection report issued of 4/27/22 (attached) discusses a CRITICAL violation of animal handling regulations in which staff negligence killed several rabbits, likely strangling them because a device was not configured properly to allow sufficient space for the animals necks:

"2.38(f)(1) Critical Miscellaneous.

A study procedure on an IACUC approved protocol involves the use of specialized equipment on anesthetized rabbits in a darkroom. To conduct the procedure, an animal is placed on a platform and the device hood (which weighs approximately 5lb) is lowered to cover the animal's head. When the hood is lowered, there is a gap between the device hood and the platform through which the animal's neck and body extends. The specialized equipment, including the hood, is used to conduct studies on both rodents and rabbits. When in the fully closed position, the gap between the platform and the hood

is approximately 1.5-2". The manufacturer of the equipment sells a device that adjusts the resting height of the hood to increase the gap by several inches to accommodate the larger body size of rabbits.

When this procedure was conducted on a cohort of 18 rabbits on July 13th, 2021, the equipment was not configured to accommodate rabbits. 3 rabbits died acutely and in sequence while being handled in the device. After these adverse events, the investigator continued the study on the remainder of the cohort."

The second inspection report issued on 4/27/22 also discusses additional failures relevant protocols, specifically incomplete protocols, as well as a violation for unqualified personnel because staff was unaware of how to report problems with animal care and treatment.

So, at least four rabbits experienced severe pain due to failure to follow an approved protocol, three rabbits were killed (likely suffocated) due to staff incompetence, likely all rabbits were subjected to improper light cycles which "can have a variety of impacts on animal health and well being." Staff also reported "instances of loss of temperature control in the vivarium."

It is highly likely that all animals in possession of Ora Inc. (36 according to the USDA inspection report) were killed, abused, or suffered significantly due to staff negligence/incompetence. Therefore this facility clearly deserves the USDA's maximum penalty of \$10,000 per infraction/per animal. A penalty of even 1/3 of this rate would result in a federal fine in the six-figure range.

I am hereby filing an Official Complaint against ORA Inc. (14-R-0217) for serious violations of the Animal Welfare Act which killed and/or abused dozens of animals.

I am calling upon your office to open a new enforcement case relevant to these violations. At the conclusion of your investigation, you must prosecute ORA Inc. (14-R-0217) to the fullest extent of the law, assessing a penalty of \$10,000 per infraction/per animal.

I expect that your office will reply to this correspondence within five business days.

OFFICIAL WARNING NOTICE OF ALLEGED VIOLATION

Re: Reference number MA220013

Dear Sir or Madam:

We believe that you failed to comply with the Animal Welfare Act (7 U.S.C. § 2131 et seq.) (AWA), and its implementing regulations, as described in the attached Official Warning. Our agency, the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), is responsible for enforcing the AWA, and regulations and other agriculture laws that help prevent the spread of animal and plant pests and diseases and ensure the welfare of animals.

After providing you with an opportunity for a hearing, we may pursue civil penalties of up to \$10,000, subject to adjustments for inflation, or other sanctions, for each alleged violation described in this Official Warning. Although we have authority to pursue penalties for the type of alleged violation(s) described in this Official Warning, we have decided not to pursue penalties in this instance so long as you comply, in the future, with the AWA and regulations.




