The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your September 5, 2023 letter reporting an instance of noncompliance with the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at the Pennsylvania State University. This letter had not been preceded by a preliminary report to OLAW.

According to the information provided, this office understands that the Pennsylvania State University Animal Care and Use Committee (ACUC) determined that instances of noncompliance occurred with respect to the escape of an animal and unexpected mortality. The final report states the death of a red backed vole was reported by the Attending Veterinarian (AV). It is stated an animal caretaker was using a plastic stube for transfer between cages when the vole leapt from the tube and ultimately fell on the floor. A research lab member assisted the animal caretaker with recapturing the animal with a plastic cup. It is understood the animal was recaptured but died shortly afterwards in the cup.

Per the report, necropsy results were inconclusive, and the AV stated the caretaker is very skilled with extensive experience in handling this species. It is stated that escapes rarely happen but can occur on occasion. The IACUC reviewed the matter and determined the incident was reportable.

OLAW agrees that the incident is reportable to our office. Reporting of such incidents by the Pennsylvania State University is consistent with the provisions of the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. It is noted that this research project is supported by PHS funding.

We appreciate being informed of these matters and find no cause for further action by this Office.

The Pennsylvania State University, in accordance with Assurance A3141-01 and PHS Policy IV.F.3., provides this report regarding non-compliance with the PHS Policy. The activities were associated with a protocol that is supported by PHS funds (#R21AI151495). This incident was first reviewed by the IACUC on June 13, 2023.

On May 26, 2023, the Attending Veterinarian (AV) reported the death of a red backed vole. Per the report, one of the voles escaped during a cage change. The animal caretaker was using a plastic tube for transfer between cages when the vole leapt from the tube, over the secondary containment bin, and fell to the floor. A research lab member was present and assisted the caretaker with recapturing the vole with a plastic cup. However, the vole died shortly afterwards in the cup. Necropsy results were inconclusive. Through follow up clarification, the AV indicated this caretaker is very skilled and has extensive experience with handling this species; he also noted that escapes during handling are rare but can happen occasionally.

The IACUC further reviewed this incident and determined it to be a reportable event.
