The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your letter dated September 20, 2018 that was provided in response to our August 20, 2018 correspondence requesting updates and additional information concerning the reported noncompliance with the Public Health Service Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at Massachusetts Eye and Ear. The noncompliance, initially reported in your August 7, 2018 letter, was discovered by the attending veterinarian during animal disposition records review and involved the unexpected deaths of seven gerbils during terminal surgeries as a result of inadequate understanding of the procedure by the laboratory personnel and an unclear description of the surgery within the IACUC protocol. Although the date(s) of when the incident was discovered was not included, we appreciate being provided with the dates of the animal procedures to clarify that the deaths occurred on six different dates from January 22, 2018 to May 16, 2018 with three procedures occurring in April.

Your response indicated that the IACUC protocol was revised to clarify the surgical procedure and that the protocol will undergo review at the September IACUC meeting. Once approved, the remainder of the previously described corrective actions will be completed which includes lab personnel undergoing training(s) on the surgery followed by assessment of training adequacy and continued monitoring by the facility veterinary staff until three successful procedure outcomes have occurred. To prevent future similar incidents, all principal investigators (PIs), laboratory managers, and IACUC members will complete mandatory training to review PI oversight of approved IACUC protocols and regulatory compliance oversight prior to December 1, 2018. All other animal users will be welcome to attend. In addition to emphasizing that personnel are to be appropriately qualified and trained in procedures, OLAW expects that the responsibility for timely communication of abnormalities or animal health concerns to the veterinary staff will be included in this mandatory training. Lastly, the letter indicated that animal charges incurred on the NIH grant during the period of noncompliance have been transferred to non-NIH funds.

We appreciate the submission of the additional information to update and further address the incident. OLAW accepts the corrective actions to reduce the likelihood of recurrence of this noncompliance and finds no cause for further action at this time. The Massachusetts Eye and Ear received a response from your office on August 20, 2018 regarding a self-reported incident of non-compliance that occurred at our Institution (PHS Assurance #D16-00215) concerning terminal surgical experiments in gerbils.

Upon review of the disposition records for gerbils, the Attending Veterinarian noted that there were 7 unexpected deaths (prior to the experimental endpoint) that occurred during repeated terminal surgical procedures to access the apical cochlea. The mortality dates were as follows:

1/22/18, 3/21/18, 4/13/18, 4/16/18, 4/19/18, 5/16/18 (2 animals)

Following a meeting regarding the incident with the PI, laboratory personnel, IACUC Office, Attending Veterinarian and Director, Animal Care, the laboratory (in consultation with the Attending Veterinarian) submitted a procedural amendment to the IACUC Office that further describes and clarifies the surgical procedure to access the apical cochlea. The amendment will be reviewed by the Full Committee at the next convened IACUC meeting to be held on September 19, 2018.

Once final IACUC approval for the amendment has been granted, the respective laboratory personnel will contact the IACUC-recommended experienced animal user to schedule training sessions for the apical surgical approach. This process will then move forward following the guidelines stated in the original letter to OLAW:

- Members of the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff will be present for these training sessions with the laboratory and the experienced animal user.
- Once the trainer and the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff have observed and documented that lab members have been adequately trained on the procedure, the lab will notify the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff in advance of performing any future terminal surgeries. Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff will discontinue monitoring these activities until three successful outcomes for this procedure.

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your letter dated August 7, 2018 regarding noncompliance with the Public Health Service (PHS) Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at Massachusetts Eye and Ear. According to the information supplied, OLAW understands that the Attending Veterinarian (AV) was performing document review and noted that there were seven unexpected deaths of gerbils during terminal surgeries. Upon investigation, the approved IACUC protocol did not include a clear description of the surgery and it was determined that the laboratory personnel needed a better understanding of the procedure and required additional hands-on training. The involved animal activity was supported by NIH grant 2R01DC007910.

Corrective actions that were reviewed by the IACUC that must be completed by the lab before further animal purchasing or before performing any additional surgical procedures include the following. A protocol amendment to clarify the surgical procedure must be submitted and approved by the IACUC. All lab personnel that will perform this surgical procedure must be trained by an IACUC-recommended experienced animal user with members of the facility veterinary staff present for the trainings until the trainer and veterinary staff observe and document that lab members have been adequately trained. Prior to any future surgical procedures, the lab is to notify the veterinary staff who will monitor the surgeries until at least three successful outcomes of the procedure.

Please note that reports of noncompliance to OLAW should include dates of occurrence when describing the incident. Please include this information in future submissions. OLAW commends the AV in identifying the potential issue regarding the unexpected deaths during review of the gerbil disposition records. We concur with the corrective measures that were described in your letter but are concerned with the absence of additional corrective actions to prevent future similar incidences. The Guide for the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals states that the IACUC and AV are responsible "for determining that performing surgical procedures are appropriately qualified and trained in the procedures" (pg. 116) and that everyone involved in animal care and use is responsible for communicating abnormalities or animal health concerns (pg. 115), such as unexpected animal deaths, to the veterinary staff.

We request further information as well as any updates regarding the progress or schedule for corrective actions already described. Please indicate any additional corrective measures that have been or that will be instituted to prevent similar occurrences of this incident. Additionally, please provide information

On June 20, 2018 a quorum of the Mass Eye and Ear Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC) found, by a unanimous vote, that a laboratory conducted a reportable violation of our Institute's PHS Assurance #D16-00215.

The committee voted unanimously that a PI committed the following violation:

Upon review of the disposition records for gerbils, the Attending Veterinarian noted that there were 7 unexpected deaths (prior to the experimental endpoint) that resulted from a terminal apical surgical approach for accessing the cochlear. After further discussions with the laboratory personnel, it was noted that the description of the surgical approach in the protocol was not clear. It was determined that the personnel performing the procedure needed a better understanding of the procedure and also needed further hands-on training for the specific technique.

This is an NIDCD-funded protocol (grant number: 2R01DC007910).

The Committee reviewed the issue of non-compliance at a convened meeting and noted that the following actions would be taken before any more animals can be purchased and any new surgical procedures can be performed:

- An amendment that further describes and clarifies the surgical procedures performed for accessing the cochlea needs to be submitted and approved by the IACUC.
- Training for all lab personnel that will perform this surgical procedure has to be scheduled with an experienced animal user named by the Committee, who has agreed to train the staff in performing the apical exposure of the cochlea. Members of the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff must be present for these training sessions.
- Once the trainer and the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff have observed and documented that lab members have been adequately trained on the procedure, the lab will need to notify the Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff in advance of performing any future terminal surgeries. Animal Care Facility Veterinary Staff will discontinue their monitoring activities after at least three successful outcomes for this procedure.
