

Dr. Gibbens,

I am writing to you today to file an Official Complaint against University of Nebraska (47-R-0018), for clear violations of the Animal Welfare Act.

University of Nebraska Correspondence dated 11/13/18 states:

"One of four rhesus macaques that underwent a protocol-approved anesthesia to administer medication via nasogastric intubation by a veterinarian, developed unexpected respiratory symptoms after apparent normal recovery from anesthesia. The medication administered was a formulation approved for use in humans for use in humans. Veterinarians immediately administered extensive rescue procedures but were unable to resuscitate the animal"

It is worth noting that, according to this same correspondence the post mortem examination of this animal found "... acute pulmonary inflammation and hemorrhage in peripheral lungs, of unknown origin."

This botched medical procedure clearly violates the federal Animal Welfare Act in several ways. Due to the botched procedure which clearly killed this animal, this may violate Sec. 2.38 Miscellaneous (f)(1) animal handling because the staff of the University of Nebraska clearly did not "handle animals in a manner that did not cause trauma or physical harm." Also, because this medical procedure was botched, it may indicate insufficiently trained or qualified staff, which would violated Sec. 2.32 Personnel Qualifications, and it may also violate Sec. 2.31 Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee, because this procedure was not performed properly in keeping with an approved experimental protocol.

It is worth noting that in a June, 2016, USDA inspection of the University of Nebraska was cited for the death of another animal in connection to a botched surgical procedure.

Since University of Nebraska negligence has now resulted in the performance of a botched surgical procedure which killed at least one animal, I must insist that you take the most severe action allowable under the Animal Welfare Act and immediately launch a full investigation of this facility, and at the culmination of this investigation, issue the maximum fine allowable against University of Nebraska -- \$10,000 per infraction, per animal.

I look forward to hearing from you in the near future about the fate of this facility.

- 5. Explanation of the Situation:
 - a. One of four rhesus macaques that underwent a protocol-approved anesthesia to administer medication via nasogastric intubation by a veterinarian, developed unexpected respiratory symptoms after apparent normal recovery from anesthesia. The medication administered was a formulation approved for use in humans. Veterinarians immediately administered extensive rescue procedures but were unable to resuscitate the animal.
 - h. Post mortem evaluation of tissues (gross and histopathologie) found acute pulmonary inflammation and hemorrhage in peripheral lungs, of unknown cause.
 - c. As the cause of this adverse event is unknown, we will continue to be careful, and extend the period of intensive post-procedural monitoring for future animals undergoing this protocol, as well as employ routine ultrasound-guided intubation.
- 6. Actions Taken by the IACUC:
 - The IACUC Subcommittee reviewed this adverse event on October 5, 2018 and determined this to be a reportable incident.

ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE.

There was an incident identified by the number 2015-11 which took place during the month of December 2015. The attending veterinarian (AV) inspected a rabbit for a post surgical procedure in which the skin edges were not apposed. The attending veterinarian gave specific written instructions to treat it as an open wound and let it heal by 2nd intention.

Research personnel decided to anesthetize the animal, debride the wound, and close the open wound without consulting the AV.

The next day the rabbit was found dead and there was no peri-operative monitoring documentation indicating that the rabbit had recovered from anesthesia.

Each research facility shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include guidance to research personnel involved in the care and use of animals regarding handling, immobilization, anesthesia, analgesia, tranquilization, and euthanasia, etc.

The facility has corrected this issue by providing operative and recovery documentation training and provided a copy of the IACUC policy for veterinary medical care and best practices.

HOUSING FACILITIES, GENERAL.

Some plastic toys/objects provided to NHP for enrichment were noticeable worn and with chewed edges. The surfaces of housing facilities-including furniture-type fixtures or objects within the facility-must be made of materials that allow them to be readily cleaned and sanitized, or removed or replaced when worn. In order to avoid animals from ingesting plastic particles and to properly clean and sanitize toys/object, these should be replaced when worn.
