Animal Care is the division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) that is responsible for the enforcement of the Animal Welfare Act. The Act provides minimum standards for the humane care and use of animals at USDA licensed or registered facilities.

Animal Care inspectors conduct routine unannounced inspections at all USDA licensed and registered facilities to ensure that they are meeting or exceeding these minimum standards. Our inspectors also conduct searches when necessary in response to valid concerns and complaints received from the public to ensure the well-being of the animals and compliance with the law. If violations are found enforcement action appropriate for the circumstances will be initiated.



Dr. Gibbens,

I am writing to you today to file an Official Complaint against the Salk Institute (93-R-0066), for what appears to be both a violation of the Animal Welfare Act and improper use of the "Teachable Moment" policy by a USDA inspector. In addition to prosecuting the laboratory, you must also deal with this inspector's apparent effort to hide this infraction from public scrutiny. The result of this incident appears to have been essentially a cover-up of a potential animal injury or death.

As you will see in the attached "Teachable Moment" document which resulted from an inspection of the Salk Institute on 4-24-18. The document states:

"Novel Non-Human enrichment should minimize the potential for injury."

And this is listed as a violation of Sec. 2.38 (f)(1). As you know, this is the animal handling section of the regulations. And failure to comply with this code section means, (quoting from a USDA Enforcement action) that the laboratory in question "failed to handle an animal in a manner that did not cause trauma or physical harm to the animal."

Now, as you also know, the requirements for classifying a potential infraction as a "Teachable Moment" are (according to the USDA Inspection Guide):

- "A Teachable Moment that meets all the following criteria:
- * Is a minor NCI that is not adversely impacting animal welfare, and
- * Is not likely to soon become a serious, Direct or other Critical, or Repeat NCI, and
- * Is not a Direct or other Critical, and

- * The facility/site is willing and able to correct the issue quickly, and
- * Was not previously listed as a Teachable Moment or cited at the site within the last two years."

Now, I fail to see how an incident in which a laboratory <u>failed to handle an animal in a manner that did not cause trauma or physical harm to the animal</u> would not <u>adversely impact animal welfare.</u>

Also, this "Teachable Moment" discusses non-human enrichment. That being the case, isn't it possible that this incident could/should have been cited under Sec. 3.81 Environment enhancement to promote psychological well-being. However, this would also have disqualified this incident from being a "Teachable Moment," because the Salk Institute was cited for violating this same code section in an inspection dated 8/10/17, less than two years from the date of this inspection, and as you know, if this same code section had been violated within two years, this could not have been a teachable moment.

In summary, since the Salk Institute apparently injured an animal or had an enrichment device that at least could injure an animal, likely a primate, this clearly should not have been a "Teachable Moment."

Therefore, I am calling upon you to retroactively issue a citation against the Salk Institute under either Sec. 3.81 Environment enhancement to promote psychological well-being or Sec. 2.38(f)(1) Animal Handling.

And, since the Salk Institute will now have violated the Animal Welfare Act five times within roughly two years, I am also calling upon you to institute a full investigation of this facility. And at the end of this investigation you must immediately begin the process of issuing the maximum fine allowable against the Salk Institute at the completion of your investigation -- \$10,000 per infraction/per animal.

I look forward to hearing from you in the near future about the fate of this facility.
