Dear Dr. Wicher,

The Office of Laboratory Animal Welfare (OLAW) acknowledges receipt of your January 3, 2020 letter reporting an instance of noncompliance with the PHS Policy on Humane Care and Use of Laboratory Animals at Roswell Park Cancer Institute. According to the information provided, a mouse was found in distress with a distended abdomen due to ascites, the investigator was notified but did not euthanize the mouse in a timely fashion, and the animal died later that day. The investigator also failed to adequately monitor mice with tumors as stated in the protocol and did not conduct ongoing body scoring. Mice that did not have a recent body score needed to be euthanized due to abdominal distension.

The corrective actions consisted of having the investigator undertake online retraining; having a senor laboratory member supervise the investigator; having a co-worker monitor and score mice when the investigator is unavailable; having the investigator certify understanding of the protocol; counseling the investigator on body scoring, distress, and humane endpoints; and ensuring all mice receive body scoring to avoid distress due to ascites. Any future violations may result in suspension of animal use privileges for this investigator.

Based on its assessment of this explanation, OLAW understands that measures have been implemented to correct and prevent recurrence of this problem. OLAW concurs with the actions taken by the institution to comply with the PHS Policy.

ISSUE: Non-compliance with directive of veterinary staff. Protocol # 1371M

## SUMMARY:

The IACUC was informed by the Attending Veterinarian (see below) that a moribund mouse (protocol 1371M) was reported to 60 (6) (6) at 9:00 the morning of November 21, 2019 and that mouse was found dead by LASR veterinary services that afternoon.

Dr. Sexton sent an e-mail at 4:31 pm on November 21, 2019 regarding the mouse that was found dead:

#### "Hello:

As the contact person responsible for the mice in IACUC protocol 1371, our staff has been reaching out to you to let you know about animals found in distress due to severely distended abdomens due to ascites.

Today a female in room (b) (4) cage # 2 was reported to you first thing in the morning and you indicated that you would come to take care of it but the animal was found dead in the afternoon. In addition your monitoring card indicated the last time you monitored the animal was 11/18. Since this is an ongoing problem and because it is an animal welfare concern I am including Dr. Moser chair of IACUC as a reported incident..."

(b) (6) responded to Dr. Sexton's e-mail at 4:40 pm November 21, 2019:

### "Heflo

I have come to take care of the mouse at 9 am, however the hood was taken. I did leave a note on the cage today, signed and dated, that I will come back for him in the afternoon as the only time slot I had was after 4:30 unfortunately. I was preparing to go down now..."

IACUC sent a memo to the PI and on November 25, 2019 expressing IACUC's concern with the mouse that she could not euthanize the mouse because someone else was in the hood. Considering that the mouse was in distress to be should have asked the person working in the hood if she could use the hood for a short period of time to euthanize the mouse or she should have contacted LASR staff to find another location to euthanize the animal (i.e. necropsy room, another procedure room etc.). Waiting was not the appropriate action since this involved an animal in a moribund condition. Another major concern to the IACUC was to be pattern of not appropriately monitoring and scoring mice with IP tumors. According to the Body Score Card for IP Tumor on the cage the mouse that died was scored on October 22nd, 25th, 31st, and November 8th an 18th. According to the approved IACUC protocol mice with abdominal tumors are to be monitored daily and scored twice a week. The Body Score Card for the mouse that died indicates that scoring was only performed every 8 to 10 days the last three times it was scored. This is a non-compliance with protocol 1371M. 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the same room (b) (4) with IP tumors indicates a consistent pattern of non-compliance with the approved IP body scoring. On October 16th LASR Veterinary Services had to request that (b) (6) euthanize mice with severe abdominal distension. These mice had not been body scored since October 8th. This was again non-compliance with the protocol which states body scoring is to be done 2 times per week. (b) (6) should be appropriately monitoring the mice for moribund and scientific endpoints and following the body scoring frequency stated in the protocol. LASR Veterinary Services should not have had to notify (b) (6) that animals need to be euthanized

The IACUC requested a corrective and preventative plan of action (CAPA) to prevent recurrence of (b) (6) non-compliance with protocol 1371M. The CAPA was received from the PI on December 16, 2019. The CAPA stated the following:

(b) (6) will retake AALAS online training and quizzes.

2. (b) (6) will be supervised by a senior lab member (to be assigned) regarding mice entered into a study by her and in her absence and seek assistance by a coworker listed on 1371M when she is unable to monitor or score her mice.

3. (b) (6) will be required to re-read IACUC protocols 1371M and 1367M including all amendments and sign an affidavit stating so (done)

4. Body Scoring procedure, importance of Body Scoring and signs of animal distress and humane endpoints will be discussed and reviewed with 60 (6)

5. To assure mice will not suffer undue stress due to abdominal distension, each (b) (6) will be assessed as per LASR mouse entered into study by SOP 12.7 for Body Scoring and as specified in 1371M and by using Body Score Cage Card.

6. Additional animal welfare violations by (b) (6) will justify removal from IACUC

protocols.

(b) (6) ompleted the online AALAS training and quizzes, reviewed the Body Scoring SOP, has reviewed the body scoring procedures and signs of distress and has signed the affidavit affirming these actions signed 12/19/2019.

The IACUC committee feels that the CAPA addresses sufficiently the root causes, the corrective plans needed and the preventative processes to prevent a recurrence of this non-compliance by (b) (6) The IACUC believes that (b) (6) understands the importance of following animal protocols, properly performing body scoring, timely response(s) to a LASR Veterinary Services request(s), and the signs of pain and distress in laboratory mice. The IACUC believes this an animal welfare concern and therefore may be reportable.

As IO I concur with the IACUC's findings and corrective actions.
