I am writing to you today to file an Official Complaint against the Pacific Biolabs 93-R-0189, for clear violations of the Animal Welfare Act.

As you know, Pacific Biolabs was inspected on 11-13-18, and this inspection discloses two Animal Welfare Act violations both of the violations are for incidents in which rabbits legs were broken:

"2.38(f)(1) CRITICAL MISCELLANEOUS. On 7/24/18 a rabbit with ID # 71434 was being handled during a dermal scoring procedure when it jumped off the table and fell five feet to the ground. It was immediately apparent that the animal had lost function of its right hind limb. It was determined that the animal had a fractured leg."

"3.53(a)(4) CRITICAL PRIMARY ENCLOSURES. On 5/1/18 a rabbit with ID # 70849 was observed to catch its front leg in the floor grate of its enclosure, and then quickly turn its body, twisting the leg in a manner that caused a fracture in the forelimb."

On 1/17/17 Pacific Biolabs was cited for another violation of Sec. 2.38 (f)(1) Animal Handling: "2.38(f)(1) CRITICAL MISCELLANEOUS. On 12/16/15 a dog identified as # 2510325 was accidentally exposed to a full-strength quaternary disinfectant called "Maxima 256" during a routine kennel cleaning procedure, and suffered severe chemical burns on its skin, oral cavity, and one eye." This inspection also cites the lab in the death of a guinea pig:

"At the time of inspection, the facility reported that a guinea pig had become entangled and died in its enclosure earlier in the week. The employee who found the animal pointed out an opening in the enclosure where the guinea pig had become entrapped, and the animal was found dead, and had apparently asphyxiated."

On 1/28/16 Pacific Biolabs was cited for a violation of Sec. 2.33 Attending Veterinarian and Adequate Veterinary Care:

"2.33 ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE. Two guinea pigs, #27604 and #27675, had pink cards noting a veterinary care issue on their enclosures. Upon inspection, it was observed that each animal had a large lesion measuring approximately one inch wide and 1/2 inch in height over the shoulder blade area. The lesions were wet, with red, hairless tissue exposed. According to staff, the lesions had resulted as a serious reaction to an adjuvant injection given as part of a study. Upon reviewing the corresponding Veterinary Services Report for each animal, and discussing the matter with the attending veterinarian, it was found that although the lesions were first observed on 1/25/16, the attending veterinarian had not been consulted until the day of inspection (1/28/16)."

Therefore in 3 inspections during less than 3 years was cited for killing a guinea pig, injuring two rabbits, and a dog. The lab was also cited for failure to provide veterinary care to two guinea pigs. Due to the nature of these injuries it is highly likely that the rabbits and the dog were euthanized as a result of their injuries. The inspection reports do not discuss veterinary treatment.

This same lab previously received an Official Warning for failure to handle a rabbit properly. Apparently this facility has a long-term problem with animal handling and care. This pattern must not

be allowed to continue. It is up to your office to initiate an enforcement action to prevent further injury to animals.

I know that your office considers major violations of the Animal Welfare Act to be very serious in nature, especially when these violations kill, abuse, or seriously injure animals. In light of the drastic incompetence of Pacific Biolabs which has killed a guinea pig, injured 2 rabbits and a dog, while also failing to provide veterinary care to guinea pigs -- I must insist that you take the most severe action allowable under the Animal Welfare Act and immediately begin the process of issuing the maximum fine allowable against Pacific Biolabs at the completion of your investigation -- \$10,000 per infraction/per animal, for a potential penalty of \$50,000.

I look forward to hearing from you in the near future about the fate of this facility.
